Pursuant to the findings of fact and conclusions of law set forth in the memorandum opinion of this Court made and entered herein this date, it is ORDERED, ADJUDGED and DECREED that the motion of the plaintiffs filed herein on June 7, 1968, and the motion of the United States filed herein on July 15, 1968, in each instance seeking to have this Court declare that the freedom-of-choice method for desegregating the public school systems of 76 of the 99 systems involved in the order made and entered herein on March 22, 1967, is constitutionally unacceptable, be and each motion is hereby denied; this denial is conditioned upon the State Board of Education, the State Superintendent of Education and the officials of each of the 76 school systems here involved complying with the requirements hereinafter set forth. Therefore, it is further ORDERED:

(1) That the faculties be desegregated in the schools listed and as indicated in the appendix to this decree, attached hereto and made a part hereof, commencing with the 1968-1969 school year; and

(2) That the Negro schools and grades enumerated in the appendix to this decree, in each of the school systems therein indicated, be closed not

later than the dates set forth in said appendix.

It is further ORDERED that the State Superintendent of Education shall require each of the 76 local school systems here involved (1) to desegregate its faculty commencing with the school year 1968-1969 as directed in the appendix; (2) to close the schools and/or the grades in the schools set forth in the appendix; (3) to take such other and further action as may be outlined for each of the school systems in the appendix, and (4) to report to him in writing, within fifteen days after the opening of the schools for the fall semester of the 1968-1969 school year, the faculty assignments for each school, the race of each teacher employed, and whether such teacher was newly employed or transferred from within the system. This report will set forth the faculty members of each race assigned to each school for the school year 1968-1969.

It is further ORDERED that all teachers assigned to the schools or grades being closed, be absorbed by transfer to other public schools within the system.

The State Superintendent of Education is further ORDERED to require the school officials in each of the 76 school systems listed in the appendix to this decree to close the schools as indicated in said appendix not later than the time indicated therein, and to file with the office of the State Superintendent of Education by August 1, 1969, a report reflecting compliance with that part of this decree requiring the closing of schools and also reflecting the schools that the pupils who were affected by the closing of said schools chose to attend for the 1969-1970 school year.

It is further ORDERED that the State Superintendent of Education, within fifteen days from the date of the receipt of the reports from the county and city Boards of Education, assemble said material and report to this Court, this report to be filed with the Court not later than August 15, 1969.

It is further ORDERED that the provisions of the decree made and entered herein on March 22, 1967, except to the extent herein modified, remain in force and effect until further order of this Court.

It is further ORDERED that the United States Marshal for this district serve a copy of this order upon the State Superintendent of Education and each member of the Alabama State Board of Education, and that the Clerk of this Court forward, by certified mail, a copy of the opinion and decree made and entered herein this date to each superintendent of education in the 76 school systems

listed in the appendix to this decree.
